He successfully kept his schools open, his teachers working and kids safe. He is the author of the School Choice Initiative which calls for public education money to follow the student. Our November meeting was held at the Forest Hills Golf Club in Cornelius, Oregon. We hosted two gubernatorial candidates, Kerry McQuisten and Bridget Barton. Keynote speakers for the November luncheon meeting were Washington County Sheriff Pat Garrett and Washington County District Attorney Kevin Barton who is running for reelection.



Gubernatorial Candidate Kerry McQuisten

Kerry McQuisten is a native Oregonian whose roots go back to the founding fathers of Baker City. She is currently the Mayor of Baker City, where she received national recognition when she passed Resolution 3881 which deemed Baker City a "common sense" sanctuary city.

On the issues she is opposed to vaccine passports, mask or any kind of mandates and defunding the police. She supports the Second Amendment and is pro-life.

Bridget Barton's message was that the Left has grossly overreached with demands such as CRT, open borders, defunding the police. Add to that rising homelessness, increased economic hardships at all levels, and crimes with no consequences. She pledged that if elected her first day of office

At twelve, she joined the International Order of the Rainbow, a masonic service organization for girls that teaches leadership through community service. She also earned trips to Puerto Rico and Cancun, Mexico. MY EXPERIENCE LIVING UNDER A DICTATORSHIP

"Oh, you can't say that, Mrs. Gruber! You will disappear!" said Dorcas in her broken English. This writer & hubby were teaching English in Taiwan in the 1970s, at a girls' college established by British nuns. The entire population was ruled by the dictator Chiang Kai Shek who arrived in 1949 and declared martial law. At that time, the population consisted of about 90% Taiwanese people and 10% Chinese, virtually all being Chiang's soldiers & families who had escaped from China as Mao's Communist thugs took over. Freedom of Speech? Oh, please, what a quaint American notion! By the time we arrived, generations of Taiwanese had learned that even mentioning the government or the dictator's name could get you "disappeared." Loved

ones of the "disappeareds" never knew if they were dead or incarcerated in the political prison offshore. There was no "right to a lawyer" and no "due process." The masses had no rights and "the law" was whatever the Ruling Elite, (that is, the Chinese "elite" who arrived with Chiang) said it was.

As an American, even a naïve 20-something, I knew that I would not be "disappeared" for speaking freely. At that time, the United States had diplomatic relations with the government of Taiwan, Republic of China. [Jimmy Carter canceled diplomatic relations January 1, 1979, thus paving the way, eventually, for China to invade Taiwan.] The worst the dictatorship would do, could do to me, would be to deport me back to the US. My US Passport protected me from imprisonment or execution.

There is nothing like living in a foreign country for an American to fully appreciate America. My two & a half years in Taiwan taught me how special it was to be an American, both because AMERICANS HAVE RIGHTS, including voting for our president, and because America had a booming economy. [I grew up before LBJ & the Dems destroyed the economy with massive tax increases, thus creating the 1970s recession.]

There, we met Alice (many Taiwanese adopted English first names in high school or college) who would become our life-long friend. She told us about the grinding poverty of her childhood in the 1950s & 60s. There was no poverty in the Wenatchee Valley where I grew up. Because her family lived in a town and was viewed as "well-off,"

a rural family begged her father to take their son into his home where he could eat regularly. They did.

In 1989, Taiwan became a democracy. Both their economy and democracy are thriving now, and the Taiwanese don't want to be taken over by Communist China. They don't want to live under the oppression of Communism.

Under Chiang, school kids were taught fake history much like the "1619 Project" that American Marxists pulled out of their backsides three years ago. Indeed, Alice has often said that she knew virtually nothing about Taiwan's history until she moved to the USA in 1978. Here, she found history books about Taiwan. Taiwan's history wasn't taught during Chiang's reign, which lasted 40 years.

BRIEF HISTORY OF TAIWAN



The Chinese Communist Party has long maintained that the Taiwanese people are really

Chinese people and that Taiwan really belongs to China. Well, that depends upon how one looks at it. Should the American colonies have been forever ruled by England even though Americans wanted to govern themselves? At the time of the American Revolution there were much closer ties between Americans and Englishmen than there is today between Taiwanese and Chinese.

Anthropologists believe humans have lived on the Island of Taiwan for tens of thousands of years. By 3000 BC they had established an agrarian culture. DNA show that these first inhabitants share the same ancestors as the original Hawaiians and other cultures around the South Pacific. They spoke an early form of Austronesian languages.

Seventy percent of Taiwan's current population is ethnic Holko who migrated from SE China beginning in the 17th Century, and still speak the Hokkien language. Also starting in the 17th Century, Hakka people crossed the sea from SE China, establishing their own distinct identity and language that is evident in Taiwan today.

During this period the Island of Taiwan was nominally part of the Chinese Empire. Taiwan & China are separated by 110 miles of ocean called the Strait of Taiwan. Thus, the Chinese government had little actual control over it and the people due to the distance, and the poor travel/communication conditions of the day. The Taiwanese were mostly free to make their own decisions and run their own affairs.

The Chinese government long considered Taiwan useless, referring to it as a place where "flowers don't bloom and birds don't shit." In reality, Taiwan is a beautiful land, covered with forests, mountains, rivers, lakes, flowers, many species of birds and numerous unique animals. As a Portuguese ship approached the island around 1542-44, the sailors called out "Ilha Formosa," which means "beautiful island."

After defeat in the Sino-Japanese War, Empress Dowager Cixi quickly ceded Taiwan to the Empire of Japan in 1895 as spoils of war. Japan occupied Taiwan until their own defeat in WWII, at which time China's nationalist government took nominal control of the island. Following defeat by Mao's Red Army in 1949, the president of the nationalist government, Chiang Kai-shek, brought what was left of his army to Taiwan and declared martial law. Martial law lasted until the late 1980s.

Since Japan owned Taiwan for 50 years (1895-1945), when we resided there virtually every Taiwanese over the age of 40 spoke Japanese as well as one or more of the native Taiwanese languages. The younger generations had been taught Mandarin Chinese in Chiang's public schools, so our college students could read, write & speak Mandarin. However, they spoke with each other in Taiwanese.

Chiang outlawed the teaching of any of the Taiwanese languages, but didn't outlaw speaking it. Of course, it was spoken at home because, in most households, that was the only way for younger generations to communicate with their elders. Unless we were in the post office or some other government office, we heard little Mandarin spoken in public, either.
